


The U.S. President's Malaria Initiative (PMI) delivers cost-effective, life-saving malaria interventions alongside catalytic technical and operational assistance to equip and empower partner countries to end malaria. PMI benefits more than **700 million** people each year.

PMI works where malaria hits hardest, supporting 24 partner countries in sub-Saharan Africa and three programs in the Greater Mekong Subregion in Southeast Asia. PMI partner countries account for almost 90 percent of all malaria cases and deaths worldwide.





Malaria is one of the world's oldest and deadliest diseases. In 1900, nearly every country in the world had malaria—including the United States. Malaria was eliminated in the United States in the 1950s.

PMI helps protect those most at risk, especially pregnant women and young children. Around three-quarters of all malaria deaths are in children under age five.

## **KEY INTERVENTIONS**

PMI provides vital funding for proven interventions such as mosquito nets, insecticides, rapid tests, and medicines. PMI also strengthens health systems to fight malaria, other infectious diseases, and future pandemics through training health workers, improving supply chains, advancing data monitoring, promoting healthy behaviors, and more.

PMI helps partner countries stay ahead of emerging threats such as insecticide and drug resistance. For example, PMI funds new tools such as next-generation nets and trains local scientists to detect early signs of resistance. PMI programs are also resilient and have continued to protect millions from malaria during the COVID-19 pandemic.
